Recovery Ready Communities

The Recovery Ready Communities certification program provides a quality measure of a city, county, or region's response to substance use disorder.

The VOA Recovery Ready Communities team works with local officials, community leaders, and other stakeholders to map a community's recovery assets and identify gaps in their local recovery-oriented system of care.

Four communities encompassing seven counties have been certified since the program officially launched in February of 2023, covering a total population of more than 500,000 Kentuckians.

Restorative Justice

VOA Restorative Justice is a different approach to the justice system that provides a way for individuals who were harmed to have a direct say in the process. Restorative Justice addresses the harm by asking who is responsible and how the harm can be repaired. This process brings together the victim, the offender and a trained counselor to attempt to make amends rather than send the case through the traditional justice system. This meeting is crucial to the healing process for the victim, offender and the community.

This alternative reduces recidivism and costs onethird of an average youth detention stay, saving substantial taxpayer dollars.


VOA HEALTH

VOA Health addresses the root causes of health inequities across Louisville, KY utilizing a variety of effective resources.

Our Determined Health program addresses social determinants of health by Community Health Workers tasked with providing outreach, education and other services to individuals. The primary goal is to connect them with high-quality health care.

The Outreach and Prevention program offers free, confidential HIV testing, Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS financial assistance, safe sex supplies and sex health education.

We offer free access to a computer lab in Louisville's West End as a community resource.



- 262 people received services from Determine Health.
- 98% of clients with high needs were linked to essential resources.
- 100% of clients receiving housing assistance remained lease compliant and/or stably housed within a 12-month reporting period.

VOA RECOVERY

Our evidence-based, outcomes-driven addiction recovery services extend far beyond just treating the root causes of substance use disorder. Our programs are the center of "recovery ecosystems" that provide numerous aftercare services including transitional housing, family recovery court, workforce re-entry and more to fortify our clients' recovery journeys.

VOA will grow more of these recovery ecosystems serving communities across Kentucky as we begin to break ground on new Freedom Houses in Stanford, Owensboro and Northern Kentucky, providing these much-

- 3.757 visits at the Recovery Community Center by unique individuals.
 - 73% of Clay County Family Recovery Court clients maintained sobriety while in the program.
 - 72% of Clay County Family Recovery Court clients had an increase in child visitation or reunification.

- 76% of Liberty Place clients increased contact with children or family.
- 90% of Freedom House mothers increased visitation with removed children or reunited with children
- 79% overall retention for clients placed in jobs in our Recovery Reintegration workforce re-entry program.

VOA HOME

VOA Home provides crucial housing assistance for families and seniors across our service area. While our communities experience a housing crisis, our Unity House family shelter, Eviction Prevention and Rapid Rehousing programs are more essential than ever. We work around-the-clock to help individuals find safe, stable and affordable housing.

Program areas include:

- Eviction Prevention
- Unity House, a family emergency shelter
- Family Stabilization Program
- Rapid Re-Housing Program
- Senior Affordable Housing
- Mobile Outreach Program
- Tenant-based rental assistance



84% of Unity House clients exited to permanent or transitional housing.

80% of Unity House clients obtained or maintained stable income.

100% of Rapid Re-Housing clients had a lease in their name at the end of 12 months of assistance.

100% of Permanent Supportive Housing successfully completed a one year lease.

 - 19 households served in our Tenant-Based Rental Assistance program with 44 people total
 - Announced plans for Monarch Station at Shelby campus, which will provide 80 units of low-income housing to Louisville residents including 20 units of permanent supportive housing.
 - Launched Mobile Outreach for those unhoused outside of the Watterson Expressway or near the **Gene Snyder Expressway.**

VOA Community provides significant services for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, allowing them to live healthy, fulfilling and engaged lives. Our In-Home Support, Supported Living, Supported Employment programs give our clients the necessary tools to become involved in their communities through job opportunities and other interactive programs.
